"Dream Compassioneers" Nepal Service Learning Journey -Exchange with Red Cross on Shelter Services, Embassy Visit to Understand Development Initiatives

TThe "Dream Compassioneers" team has just completed a seven-day service learning journey and returned to Hong Kong. The team departed in late April, first stopping in Kunming before arriving in Nepal for the service trip. In Kunming, they visited the National Southwestern Associated University—a temporary institution formed during the Sino-Japanese War by Peking University, Tsinghua University, and Nankai University—learning about the resilience and dedication to education during challenging times. They then flew to Kathmandu, Nepal's capital, to begin their service journey.

As Executive Director Ms. Or Ka Ying Ice, who planned the trip, noted: "Providing service and aiding children in need is the mission of Dream Compassioneers. This journey has been incredibly rewarding, and we hope to lead even larger teams in the future to make greater contributions."

Exchanges with Service Organizations & Orphanage Visits



"The team met with Namita, Director of Human Harmony Nepal, Mr. Ashok Karki, Director of Junior and Youth Red Cross Department at NRCS, and Mr. David Fodgen, Country Cluster Manager at Danish Red Cross in Nepal, to discuss future service collaborations. Executive Director Ms. Ice Or and Ng Wai Kiu (Iris), a Dream Compassioneers representative from Yan Chai Hospital Law Chan Chor Si College (supported by the CLAP@JC Scholarship), shared the organization's service initiatives. Iris expressed: "I'm grateful to Dream Compassioneers and The Jockey Club for this opportunity, which has enriched my service experience. I'm committed to helping more people in need in the future."



Compassioneers" engaged with Human Harmony Nepal, the Nepal Red Cross Society (NRCS), and the Danish Red Cross Country Office in Nepal, gaining insights into local conditions and service programs. Notably, the Nepal Red Cross Society boasts over one million registered members and more than 100,000 active volunteers.

The team also visited **The Orphans Home**, a shelter caring for abandoned children. Members from Yan Chai Hospital Law Chan Chor Si College, including Adelin Lin Ho Yan (President of the Dream Compassioneers Club) and Tethys Lam (Committee Member), along with Jaymee Wat (Subsidiary Committee Member from Sha Tin College), helped collect and deliver supplies. Dream Compassioneers also donated funds to support the shelter's operations.

Ms. Chloe Wong Sze Kiu, SCMP Student of the Year (Community Contributor) and Chairperson of the Executive Committee (studying Early Childhood Education at CUHK), led interactive activities with the children, singing and dancing together. The farewell was emotional, with many moved to tears. Ms. Nicole Chan Wai Lam, former President of the Hong Kong Red Cross University Club, who previously visited a Red Cross shelter in Nepal, reflected: "The children's smiles and hugs deeply touched me, strengthening my resolve to continue serving."

Founder Mr. Chan Yik Yeung shared: "This experience reminded me of the profound, genuine connections formed during shelter visits." Ms. Bobo Wong Suet Ying, a registered social worker who previously volunteered in Cambodia, added: "Every service trip reaffirms my purpose-to make a difference in society."





Visit to the Chinese Embassy: Understanding Local Development

The team also had the honor of visiting the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in Nepal. Through an introduction by representative Ms. Gong Xu, they learned about Sino-Nepalese collaborations in sports, arts, and education, including initiatives like Nepal's dragon boat team and Confucius Institutes.

As the two nations celebrate 70 years of diplomatic relations, their "strategic partnership for generations of friendship toward development and prosperity" continues to flourish. The visit highlighted China's contributions to Nepal, particularly under the Belt and Road Initiative. Charlie Lin Kai Chun, a CUHK Global Business student returning to Nepal for the second time, remarked: "This trip deepened my understanding of China's aid projects here and inspired me to further serve developing nations, fostering international goodwill." The restoration of earthquake-damaged UNESCO heritage sites like Durbar Square by Chinese experts left a lasting impression.

During this journey, our team visited the Chinese Embassy in Nepal, an orphanage, Human Harmony Nepal, the Red Cross, as well as cultural sites such as the cremation temple and Durbar Square. Among these experiences, the three most memorable places are as follows. First, the most unforgettable moment was at the orphanage. I saw many children who had lost their parents. 

Last month, we were honored to invite the "Cloud Sun Service Team" from the Student Union of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, as guest speakers for the 32nd regular online seminar "Passion to Talk, Talk to Inspire" presenting on the topic "Happiness Can Be This Simple - Sri Lanka Volunteer Teaching Trip 2024."

The speakers vividly described their experiences and observations during their volunteer teaching trip in Sri Lanka, including the living conditions and cultural customs of the local residents, as well as heartwarming and amusing anecdotes of interacting with the local children. This volunteer teaching activity not only provided more learning opportunities for the local children, allowing them to experience Hong Kong's local culture, but also actively promoted the spirit of service, encouraging more people to care for vulnerable communities.

While teaching the local children knowledge, the volunteer team members also learned from them the simple joy and passion for life. In addition, the speakers shared the difficulties they encountered during the process and how they solved them, such as whether they experienced acclimatization issues or language communication problems.
